# Closer to the Ground, Deeper in Impact

The year 2024 was one of momentum and meaning at RYTHM Foundation. We deepened our impact within our organisation and the communities we serve.

Our local and international efforts, including the **Volunteer Development** Programme (VDP) and **Employee Community** Impact (ECI), helped grow a culture of service. Taarana School — our centre for children with cognitive and sensory learning needs — was named Best Special Education Centre of the Year at the 2024 PEEAM EduAwards, a reminder of why inclusion stays at the heart of our mission.

We marked key milestones — expanding the Maharani School Programme (MSP) to Negeri Sembilan, launching the Indigenous Development Programme (INDEP), and introducing Safer Cities for Girls in India to protect and empower adolescent girls.



We also committed USD33,334 to Malaysia's fine and performing arts — investing in scholarships and grants to support young talent and keep the country's creative future alive.

These achievements were only possible because of the trust and dedication of our partners and the communities we serve. As we look to 2025, we carry forward the same conviction: Real change starts with collective effort — and the courage to keep showing up.

#### Datin Sri Umayal Eswaran

As Chairperson of RYTHM Foundation's Board of Governance, Datin Sri Umayal steers the Foundation's mission to drive sustainable, transformative change across communities and borders.

She provides strategic direction and oversight, guiding the evaluation of initiatives and shaping the rollout of impactful programmes. As the Foundation's spokesperson, she plays a vital role in championing its work and amplifying its reach.

Datin Sri Umayal's commitment to inclusion led to the establishment of the award-winning Taarana School, a centre that supports children with cognitive and sensory learning needs through specialised education and therapy.

Alongside the Founder and Executive Chairman of the QI Group of Companies, Dato' Sri Vijay Eswaran, she also champions the arts as a powerful force for cultural preservation and creative expression, further grounding the Foundation's vision in empathy and human connection.

#### **Mr Nicholas Goh**

Mr Nicholas Goh is the Chief Operating Officer of Quest International University (QIU), where he champions the philosophy of "Leave No One Behind." Since his appointment to the Board of RYTHM Foundation in 2009, he has been key in advancing QIU's mission to develop futureready, solutions-driven graduates.

With a strong foundation in academic administration and industry engagement, Nicholas has helped align QIU's programmes with real-world demands — equipping students with practical skills and grounded human values.

Under his leadership, the university has launched research initiatives in stem cell therapy, botanical drugs, climate-resilient crops, and food security, often in collaboration with national and global partners.

Outside of QIU, Nicholas chairs the management committee of Lai Meng Kindergarten and serves on the boards of Chinese vernacular schools SJK (C) Lai Meng and SJK (C) Puay Chai. He is also Vice Chairman of the Malaysian International Chamber of Commerce & Industry (MICCI) in Perak. He previously served on the board of visitors at Hospital Kuala Lumpur for eight years.

#### Tan Sri Dato' Seri Haji Megat Najmuddin bin Dato' Seri Dr Haji Megat Khas

Tan Sri Dato' Seri Haji Megat Najmuddin bin Dato' Seri Dr Haji Megat Khas is a prominent Malaysian legal and corporate figure whose career spans more than five decades. A graduate of the University of Singapore with an Honours Degree in Law (1970), he began his professional journey with First National City Bank (now Citibank) before moving into legal practice and eventually establishing a successful firm.

Tan Sri Megat Najmuddin has held several key leadership roles in the corporate sphere. He served as Chairman of Sime Darby Plantation Berhad from July 2020 until his retirement in June 2023, and previously chaired SEG International Berhad and Farm Fresh Berhad. He also sat on the Board of PETRONAS from April 2010 to April 2017, contributing to strategic oversight at one of Malaysia's most significant institutions.

His influence extends well beyond boardrooms. He was President of the Malaysian Institute of Corporate Governance (MICG) from 1998 to 2015 and now serves as its Honorary Patron. He currently leads the Federation of Public Listed Companies Berhad as its President, continuing to shape Malaysia's corporate governance landscape.



Appointed to the Board of RYTHM Foundation on 10 July 2013, Tan Sri Megat Najmuddin is steadfastly committed to transparency, ethical leadership, and public accountability. A respected voice in both the public and private sectors, his enduring contributions continue to elevate governance and integrity standards across Malaysia's institutions.

# Building InclusionThe ANOPA Project

In Ghana, RYTHM Foundation supported the Aboom School for Special Needs, Dzorwulu Special School, and Ghana National Basic Inclusive School in Cape Coast and Accra to create accessible and supportive learning environments. Our work over the year focused on teacher training, specialised educational resources, inclusive sports, and infrastructure upgrades to ensure children with disabilities can thrive in education and community life.

Through education, skills, infrastructure, and sports, this partnership creates a more inclusive Ghana, proving that communities thrive when everyone has access to opportunities.

# Breaking the Poverty Cycle — Parinaama Development Foundation & Door Step School

In rural North Bengal, where poverty and limited access to education restrict opportunities, RYTHM Foundation partnered with Parinaama Development Foundation and Door Step School (India) to launch a three-year literacy project in Jalpaiguri. Running until 2026, the initiative focuses on strengthening children's and adults' basic literacy and numeracy skills, creating a pathway out of poverty through education.

The project goes beyond reading and writing by addressing barriers such as financial constraints, lack of awareness, and inadequate infrastructure. It fosters lifelong learning, community engagement, and empowerment, ensuring education becomes accessible and sustainable.

#### **Our Core Focus**

Improving foundational literacy and numeracy for children and adults, while encouraging school enrolment and regular attendance.

# Advancing a Remote PeopleNational Forum for Advocacy Nepal

The Chepang people, one of Nepal's most marginalised Indigenous groups in Raksirang, face extreme poverty, food insecurity, and limited access to education. With most families living below the poverty line and in remote locations, opportunities for sustainable development are scarce.

RYTHM Foundation partnered with NAFAN on the Sustainable Community Project to address these challenges, focusing on education, women's empowerment, and long-term social progress. The initiative aimed to reach 250 people, including 180 girls and women, by boosting school enrolment, improving attendance, and expanding literacy.

Boosting school enrolment and consistent attendance among Chepang children, while nurturing a culture of literacy and learning.





# Safer Spaces for Girls and Women — Plan International

In Delhi's high-risk communities, RYTHM Foundation and Plan International are working to protect girls aged 13 to 18 from harassment and gender-based violence. The initiative equips girls to move freely and confidently while engaging boys and men as allies in prevention through safe spaces, self-defence training, educational workshops, and community outreach.

Over three years, the partnership will reach at least 12,000 people — including families and policymakers — to build safer, more equitable environments for girls to learn and thrive.

The initiative helps children heal, rebuild trust, and create pathways to a brighter future through safe spaces, counselling, education, skills training, and family engagement.



# Learning to Lead — Maharani School Programme & Maharani Learning Lab

The Maharani School Programme (MSP), RYTHM Foundation's flagship initiative since 2011, equips adolescent girls with confidence, resilience, and leadership skills through camps and year-round activities.

The initiative continued to expand in 2024 with school-based sessions (Selangor and Negeri Sembilan) and a leadership camp (Negeri Sembilan). These nurtured confidence, resilience, and life skills, quided by trained facilitators who created safe and supportive spaces for learning and growth. The related Maharani Learning Lab (MLL) was also relaunched in 2024 with a focus on digital skills to help participants be future-ready.

# From Settlement to School — Sekulah Bateq

In 2024, the Sekulah Bateq (Bateq School) initiative reached a historic turning point: 29 indigenous Orang Asli Bateq children — who'd started in RYTHM's makeshift village school — became the first in their community to enrol in a mainstream national school. It marked a period of informal classes, trust-building with families, and consistent basic education, translating into access to formal schooling.

That leap wasn't just about classes — it was about dismantling exclusion barriers and showing that indigenous children can thrive in their traditions and the national education system with the proper support. It's a milestone of belonging, dignity, and possibility.



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
# Sustaining Arts and Culture — Vijayaratnam Fine & Performing Arts Initiative

# Finding Her Voice with Maharani

# Lessons in courage, confidence, and community

When Diyana Batrisyah Muhammad joined RYTHM Foundation's Maharani School Programme (MSP) in 2022, the 16-year-old wasn't sure what to expect. The secondary school SMK Gombak Setia student in Kuala Lumpur was still figuring out who she was.

"At first, I was shy. I did not want to speak up or join in. Slowly, I started to feel braver and more open. Maharani taught me how to believe in myself," Diyana admits. One of her favourite memories was the "Explorace" at camp, where she and her friends applied everything they'd learned while working as a team. "That is when I realised I could lead and not be afraid of making mistakes," she says.

The programme's mix of mini games and supportive facilitators made each session fun and welcoming. Diyana admits that staying



confident wasn't always easy, but she found strength in the lessons on self-love and leadership — lessons she still carries into her everyday life.

# From Uncertainty to Enterprise

## A collective built on resilience and belief

When Imelda Kasung joined RYTHM Foundation's Community Adoption Programme (CAP) in Kiulu, Sabah, in East Malaysia, she felt excitement and doubt. The women's entrepreneurship initiative with Good Shepherd Services set out to help women organise, build businesses, and improve livelihoods. For Imelda and a group of women from three villages, it was unfamiliar ground.

"In the beginning, we were unsure. Some of us doubted whether we could make it work. People even dropped out. But I told myself, if we don't try, we'll never know what we're capable of."

Despite setbacks, they formed the Kiulu Community Collective Enterprise (KCCE) and launched 'Kiulu Kio', a brand that turned overlooked resources like Liposu fruit and banana stems into marketable products.

For Imelda, the journey has meant more than profit. CAP gave her leadership skills, financial know-how, and confidence. More than that, it taught her persistence and the value of teamwork.




"I've learned this is not just about profit. It is about the courage to start, the patience to learn, and the strength to continue even when things get hard."



The rough mountain paths make travel exhausting. Farming and gathering forest food are their mainstays, but bad weather and natural disasters can wipe out their harvests and animals overnight.

For women like Maili, survival has long been the focus. Education felt distant, almost impossible. That changed when she joined a programme run by RYTHM Foundation and the National Forum for Advocacy Nepal (NAFAN).

"Before, I could not even write my name," Maili says. "Now I can read letters, write my name, and speak in front of others without fear. I feel proud."

The programme not only gave her basic literacy but also renewed her belief in the power of education



for the next generation. She hopes young girls in her community will benefit even more.


"I am thankful for this chance. I hope they continue supporting education, especially for girls. It can change our lives."

Outside the classroom, Nandini dreams of becoming a doctor. She also loves music and dance, though she




lacks the resources to explore these passions fully. Instead, she has persistence — a quiet determination that continues to push her forward.




